KEN'S CORNER

January is safety month in Butler Creek.

Fire prevention

Clean up debris from all areas of your house. Remove all cardboard paper and old clothes from your home. Consider donating to Goodwill. They will give you a receipt for your taxes.

Replace smoke alarms after 10 years. If you have any gas appliances — furnace, water heater, or gas range, you must have carbon monoxide detectors installed on every level of your home. These detectors have a built in expiration circuit that will alarm you to the fact that the detector has expired. My carbon monoxide detector recently went off — we called the fire department and they had a sniffer that found that the source of carbon monoxide was the clogged drier.

Keep yard debris away from your foundation. It is recommended that shrubs and bushes be 18 inches from the foundation of your home. This will help keep the fire away from your home by keeping the fuel away from it.

The use of extension cords can cause fire hazards. The longer the cord is, the more resistance in that conductor. As that cord heats up it cause the copper to conduct less. This leads to higher current draw that leads to thermal runaway and the extension cord will heat up. Use a heavy duty extension cord. The extension cord is rated by the conductor size, 12-3 is a heavier cord than 14-3 or 16-3. This 12-3 rating is directly associated with the wire thickness. This extension cord will be more expensive than the 14-3 and 16-3 rated cables, but will also handle heat and current draw better than the thinner 14-3 or 16-3. If you are using an extension cord for anything in your home then you need to add outlets in that area. The use of extension cords should be avoided at all costs. If you have to use them, use a heavy duty cord rated at 12-3. Avoid using the small brown or white home extension cords. These are rated at 18-2 and are the worst ones to use. Throw them away.

Never use a space heater attached to an extension cord or power strip – heaters draw a lot of power and using them with extension cords or power strips is responsible for 16 percent of the house fires in the United States.

Theft prevention

Lock your doors. Keep a key with you when you head outdoors. Lock your door when your in the yard. The most important thing to remember is to light your yard with motion detector lights porch lights and spot lights. Criminals do not want to be seen and they will shy away from a property that is well lit. Keep shrubs and bushes trimmed to eliminate hiding spaces in your yard for criminals.

Appliance safety

Inspect your drier vent for lint build up. Clean out your drier as well as the the vent. Never plug a large appliance into an extension cord but it should be plugged into the wall receptacle. Check water supply lines for your washing machine. Replace older rubber hoses with the new heavy duty beaded hose. Replace after ten years.
